

## A Word From the Pastor

Dear Friends,

As I write this, our congregation is moving through Holy Week towards the joyous celebration of Easter. There is always something special about this journey for me. We move from the excitement of Palm Sunday through the solemn shadows of Holy Week into the glorious light of Easter. It has become for me an annual pilgrimage that holds both mystery and renewal.

You may have heard about our decision as a congregation to form a Ministry Action Plan (MAP). I want to encourage you to be part of that if it is at all possible. The leadership of our church joins me in encouraging wide participation – or, to use the language I have been using, to bring more voices to the table. The need for this is quite obvious to anyone who gathers with us week by week. We will consider where we are now – but also where we want to be as a church. All groups and organizations benefit from such a period of review.

That is also what our Annual Conference does from time to time. We look at where United Methodism is headed in the future. A while back the clergy met with the Bishop to talk about where we are in the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference and where we might be headed. The news wasn't great.

In the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference there are:

- 597 Churches.
- 20% of total average attendance is found in the 20 largest congregations.
- 20% of total average attendance is found in 306 of the smallest congregations (51% of all churches).

- Our largest 20 churches grow at a rate of 2.5% per year.
- Our smallest 306 church decline at a rate of 7% per year.
- In 1965 Methodists represented approximately 6.5% of New Jersey's population.
- In 2010 United Methodists represent approximately 1.2% of New Jersey's population.
- The average age of GNJAC members is approximately 57.
- The average age of a New Jerseyan is approximately 37.
- In many churches persons in their fifties are among the youngest members.
- Over the last forty years the number of Methodists in GNJAC has declined by over 100,000.
- Over the last forty years the population of New Jersey alone has increased by over 3 million.
- There are about 65 fewer churches in GNJAC than 40 years ago.

The question the Bishop asked was "Where did all the people go?" Our Bishop shared the response of Bishop Robert Schnase from his book, Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations. "They didn't all get mad and leave; they just grew old and died, and no one took their place. The decline [in our denomination] has not been a backdoor problem but a front-door problem. We've failed to bring new people into our churches, and we've done poorly at passing along the faith to the next generation."

Not passing on the faith to the next generation is a problem we need to be concerned about. We must recall some of our own history and employ it in this present age. Susanna Wesley was concerned to pass her faith on to her children. It was said of Susanna Wesley that "she was always most anxious for the spiritual welfare of her children. It was her habit to have one or more of them in her room each evening for a quiet talk and prayer. 'On Thursday I talk with Jacky, and on Saturday with Charles.' The children loved these quiet times with mother."

As United Methodists we come from a tradition where home and church partnered to help people grow in faith and discipleship. We need that partnership to help us head into a future where children and youth are growing in faith and becoming committed disciples. They are the church that will carry us into the future.

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

## **Hymn Story**


# "Hymn of Promise" Natalie A. Sleeth - UMH # 707

"Hymn of Promise" is one of the newest hymns found in the UM Hymnal. It is a beautiful hymn that is very appropriate for the seasons of Easter and Spring.

Natalie A. Sleeth was a Methodist composer of choral anthems and hymns, and was married to Ronald Sleeth, a Methodist pastor and professor of homiletics at Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University. She wrote this selection in February 1985 as a choral anthem and later adapted it as a hymn. She wrote that she was:

"...pondering the death of a friend (life and death, death and resurrection), pondering winter and spring (seeming opposites), and a T. S. Eliot poem which had the phrase, 'In our end is our beginning.' These seemingly contradictory 'pairs' led to the thesis of the song and the hopeful message that out of one will come the other whenever God chooses to bring that about."

The hymn was played at Ronald Sleeth's funeral by his request and has since become a popular funeral hymn. It also reminds us about the theme of rebirth found in Easter and the season of Spring.

### **Town Hall Events for MAP**



By now you have heard of the pending Town Hall events to discuss our Ministry Action Plan (MAP). These events are scheduled for:

Saturday, April 9 at 9:00 AM (Breakfast)

Sunday, April 17 at 12:30 PM (Lunch)

Earlier in this newsletter, Pastor Ernie shared some information that presented a sobering view of the general state of the UMC. While we cannot solve all of those problems (nor should we try), what we can do is focus on items that will help DeBows reach its full potential as a church.

The Town Hall events are opportunities for us to gather as a church to collectively discover how we can make that happen. This is your chance to influence the MAP process and let your voice be heard.

The purpose of the MAP process is to define a specific list of goals, which if successfully completed will improve our church. The MAP will be published and included as part of our annual Church Conference reporting. While DeBows will be responsible for the details and implementation of the goals, Conference will ask two high level questions:

1. Are the goals SMART goals, where SMART is an acronym that stand for:

**S**pecific

Measurable

**A**ttainable

Relevant

Time-Framed

- Do the goals address one or more of the five key growth factors of Vital Congregations:
  - Profession of Faith
  - Worship Attendance
  - Development of Small Groups
  - Engagement in Outreach Ministry
  - Generosity to Mission

These items and other elements of the MAP process will be discussed in more detail during the Town Hall, but most of all we want to hear your thoughts, ideas and concerns.

Your attendance at one of the two Town Hall events is strongly encouraged. Sign-up sheets are posted outside of Fellowship Hall for these events. We look forward to seeing you there as we work together to make DeBows the best church possible.

## The Road to Emmaus

Luke: 24:13-35 is the only detailed account of Jesus' post-resurrection walk to Emmaus. The risen Christ travels about seven miles from Jerusalem alongside two grieving disciples (possibly a husband and wife returning from Jerusalem). The two already know the testimony of the women at the empty tomb, but they fail to recognize their teacher until he joins them for a meal.

Of the multiple post-resurrection accounts found in Scripture, which include over five hundred believers experiencing the risen Christ, the Road to Emmaus story is perhaps the most dramatic of all Jesus' post-resurrection appearances.

It is also the passage of Scripture that inspired the UpperRoom ministry "Walk to Emmaus": a three day spiritual retreat. You can read more about this ministry at <a href="mailto:emmaus.upperroom.org">emmaus.upperroom.org</a>.
