## A Word From the Pastor

Dear Friends,

How quickly things change. Not too long ago we complained about the cool weather and the protracted winter -- abruptly a new note is struck as we watch the mercury suddenly rise uncomfortably. Not too long ago we were waiting for the green shoots to sprout. Suddenly all of nature is dressed in green. It seems that we celebrated Easter so recently and now we are already edging into the new liturgical season of Pentecost.

As Easter yields to Pentecost, it is good to remind ourselves that Pentecost is both a "festival" and a "season." As festival, Pentecost is the high day that takes precedence over many others on the church's calendar. We mark the day for several reasons:

- Pentecost is often viewed as a kind of "birthday" of the church. So having balloons and birthday cakes are not inappropriate. The balloons in our sanctuary on Pentecost Sunday referenced that aspect of Pentecost.
- It is the anniversary of the Holy Spirit coming upon the disciples bringing them the power they needed for their ministry in fulfillment of God's promise to send upon the believers the Helper/Advocate to equip the disciples for their ministry.
- Pentecost marks the completion of Christ's earthly ministry, the work of redemption and reconciliation, and signals the beginning of the Holy Spirit's ministry through the church.

As "season," Pentecost is relatively new. For many years the season was known simply as "Sundays after Trinity Sunday" because of the focus of on the Trinity in Northern Europe. In 1570, the Roman Catholic Church adopted the name "Sundays after Pentecost" – but Protestants continued with their "Trinity" focus until a unified lectionary was established in1970. This season Pentecost will last for 27 Sundays.

The name comes from the Greek referring to the "50 days after Easter." At one time Pentecost was called Whitsunday. That is an English contraction of "White Sunday" – so called because candidates for Baptism and Confirmation wore white robes on this day to symbolize the joy of the occasion, and to indicate that they were cleansed by the Spirit.

As "festival" and "season", we celebrate the coming of God's Spirit as the sustaining and energizing power of God. The Spirit is the extension of Jesus Christ in the world. This is the gift God promised, and is mediated to us through the Son. Without the Spirit, and the fruit and gifts of the Spirit, we are impoverished as individuals and as a church family. Let us pray that the 27 weeks of the Pentecost season this year will bring to us a new openness to this gift of God among us in our community of faith.

### **History of Father's Day**

Having reviewed the history of Mother's Day last month, it is only fair we give fathers equal time this month. You would think that having an official celebration of Father's Day would flow naturally from the establishment of Mother's Day; well it did, but fathers had to wait a little longer than you might think.

Father's Day as we know it originated in United States when Sonora Louise Smart Dodd, being inspired by the efforts of Anna Jarvis to establish Mother's Day (see the May newsletter), sought а similar holiday celebrating fathers.

Sonora felt strongly for fathers because of the affection she received from her own father William Jackson Smart. a Civil War veteran. Sonora's mother died while giving birth when she was just 16. Mr. Smart raised the newborn and five other children with love and care.

After hearing a Mother's Day sermon in 1909 Ms. Dodd began a rigorous campaign to celebrate Father's Day in the US. Supported by the Spokane, WA Ministerial Association and the local YMCA, Spokane celebrated its first Father's Day on June 19, 1910.

After several years President Woodrow Wilson, in response to apparent national support, expressed approval for the concept of Father's Day in 1916, but stopped short of issuing a formal proclamation as he had done for Mother's Day in 1914. President Calvin Coolidge also supported the idea of a national Father's Day in 1924 to, "establish more intimate relations between fathers and their children and to impress upon fathers the full measure of their obligations". Finally, after more than four decades, President Lyndon Johnson signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day in 1966, which was made permanent in 1972 by President Richard Nixon.

Sonora Louise Smart Dodd was honored for her efforts at the World's Fair in Spokane, WA in 1974. Ms. Dodd died in 1978 at age 96.

### Hymn Story

### "The Church's One Foundation" Samuel John Stone – UMH #545

The Rev. Samuel John Stone was well aware of the power of singing when in 1866 he wrote and published *Lyra Fidelium* (Lyre of the Faithful), a series of twelve hymns, one for each article of the Apostles' Creed. As a curate in the town of Windsor, England, he was aware of his parishioners' use of the Apostles' Creed in their private prayers. But he was concerned that many of them did not fully grasp the meaning of what they said. He believed the mechanical reading of the Creed was too academic and disconnected from the average worshipper, and lacked a devotional spirit.

"The Church's One Foundation" has become the most popular of the twelve hymns and addresses the ninth article of the Apostles' Creed: "I believe in the Holy Catholic (Universal) church" and "the communion of the saints."

Stone wrote the hymn as much to explain the faith as he did to defend it. The former is readily apparent in the doctrine referenced from the Apostles' Creed and Scripture verses such as Colossians 1:18, I Corinthians 3:11, and Ephesians 2:20. They remind us that Christ Himself is the center and foundation, and those who build on that foundation are all united in the one holy church.

The concept of defending the faith is a little less obvious and needs some historical context to understand. Observe the text in stanza 3; "Though with a scornful wonder we see her sore oppressed, by schisms rent asunder, by heresies distressed..." Did you ever wonder what that verse refers to? Today we most likely read those words as a generic caution against those who bear false witness about the Scriptures or otherwise promote heresy. But in 1866 those words were written in reference to a particular person and situation.

In 1863 John William Colenso (1814 -1883), the Anglican bishop of Natal, South Africa, published "*The Pentateuch and the Book of Joshua Critically Examined*". This book denied that Moses wrote the Pentateuch, called Joshua a myth, called the books of Chronicles fictitious, and disputed the accuracy of Christ's statements about Moses. The bishop of Cape Town, South Africa, Bishop Gray, supported by 40 other bishops deposed Colenso for his heresy. But Colenso appealed to a secular court and was reinstated, creating a schism in the South African Anglican church that lasted until Colenso's death.

While controversial at the time, it had no significant lasting impact on the church. It is only presented here to help explain why Stone, a supporter of Bishop Gray, included the text in his hymn. It should be noted that Bishop Colenso was considered a social activist and is credited with performing a significant amount of missionary and advocacy work on behalf of native Africans, particularly those in Natal and Zululand, including translating the New Testament and other parts of Scripture into the Zulu language.

Today "The Church's One Foundation" is one of our most sung and treasured hymns. It can also be noted that it is normally sung to the tune AURELIA written by Samuel Sebastian Wesley, grandson of Charles Wesley.

And how, back in the day, church bells would be rung to let people know the time, when a worship service was about to begin, or maybe to denote a special event in the life of a community.

Do you know the story of the large red bell that sits in front of our church?



Well, this is the bell from the original bell tower of DeBows, which was removed when our church steeple was installed. It is functional and we still ring it once in a while for special occasions.
